
Keynote Speaker: Dr. Elizabeth Eckford

Elizabeth Eckford is a true hero of the Civil Rights Movement. In 1957, 15-year-old Elizabeth was one of nine Black students, now known as **The Little Rock Nine**. Following the U.S. Supreme Court decision of *Brown v. Board of Education*, these students were chosen for their academic excellence to attend the most prestigious school in the state of Arkansas, previously all-white. In unlawful resistance, the Arkansas governor called upon the Arkansas National Guard to block these brave students from fulfilling this Court mandate. On that fateful day, Elizabeth arrived alone to an angry mob of segregationists. This photo by Will Counts galvanized worldwide attention, and U.S. President Eisenhower was prompted into responding to the crisis by calling in 1,200 armed Federal Troops to usher these students safely to school. Elizabeth's courage in the face of extreme circumstances calls us into action to end the



violence of racism that still plagues our communities and nation, and to stand for peace. Dr. Eckford went on to earn a Degree in History from Central State University in Ohio. In 2018, she was awarded an honorary Doctorate Degree from Knox College. Dr. Eckford is the subject of many historic books, including *Little Rock Girl 1957: How a Photograph Changed the Fight for Integration*, by Shelly Tougas. In 2018, she wrote her autobiography, *The Worst First Day: Bullied While Desegregating Little Rock Central High*. In 1999, Dr. Elizabeth Eckford was awarded the highest civilian award in the United States, the U.S. Congressional Gold Medal. <u>The Story Behind the Famous Little Rock Nine 'Scream Image' - HISTORY</u>
