

Following the dream from the Guard to West Point





Pfc. Nathaniel Okyere-Bour learned early that following a dream requires sacrifice.

When the New Jersey Army National Guard Soldier was three, his mother sent him to Ghana to live with her family while she followed her dream of becoming a nurse. She brought him back to New Jersey after she'd completed bachelors and masters degrees and landed a job as an intensive-care nurse at a prestigious Manhattan hospital.

The example led Okyere-Bour to set lofty goals as he grew up in a small Jersey City apartment. He achieved the first by gaining admittance to Jersey City's McNair Academic High School. As graduation from the elite magnet school approached, the target shifted to top colleges, including Duke University and the University of Chicago. He got in. But the money wasn't there.

So Okyere-Bour enlisted in the New Jersey Army National Guard in 2013 with the aim of using a tuition waiver to attend Rutgers University. But something happened at basic training at Fort Jackson, S.C. Okyere-Bour got a new goal.

The battalion commander spoke to us. He talked about how he went to West Point and what it meant to him. I thought, 'That's what I want.'

On June 29, Okyere-Bour will join the U.S. Military Academy Class of 2019. He will be among 25 Army National Guard Soldiers accepted directly to West Point this year. Eleven others will attend West Point's preparatory academy.

In the end, Okyere-Bour's New Jersey National Guard leaders helped pave the road from Fort Jackson to West Point.

When Okyere-Bour joined F Company of the 250th Brigade Support Battalion as a wheeled vehicle mechanic two years ago, the unit's leaders say he caught their attention with stellar performance – and

his insistence that he had what it took to get into West Point.

They ultimately agreed. All of the officers and non-commissioned officers in Okyere-Bour's chain of command wrote letters of recommendation.

"How could we not? He's one of those Soldiers who does everything right the first time and does it when you ask and never, ever asks 'Why?," said Sgt. 1st Class Dennis Mahon, his platoon sergeant. "We knew it would be a hell of an achievement if he did it, and we were pulling for him. Who knows, he may be a general someday."

Sgt. James Diana, his squad leader, said the unit made accommodations to allow Okyere-Bour to make up drill time that he missed during the arduous application process.

"We knew that if he got in, it would reflect well on all of us, our unit and the Guard," Diana said. "West Point isn't going to be easy. But I know he can do it." We knew it would be a hell of an achievement if he did it, and we were pulling for him. Who knows, he may be a general someday.

It turned out that the person who taught Okyere-Bour to dream big, his mother, Elizabeth, at first didn't realize the magnitude of her son's achievement.

"I grew up in Ghana," she said with a laugh. "I didn't know anything about West Point."

But it became clear when and she told a co-worker at Mount Sinai Hospital about the acceptance letter.

"He was like 'What?' The next thing I knew there was a crowd of intensive-care nurses jumping up and down," Kathleen Okyere-Bour said. "Then I understood what my son had done. It was a very big deal."

Okyere-Bour says he hasn't decided what he'll study at West Point. He's not sure what branch he'll request either, although he said the officers in the field artillery unit his company supports have assured him there's only one branch to pick, and its acronym is 'FA.'

In the meantime, Okyere-Bour will finish out his first year at Rutgers. Although the credits will not transfer to West Point, he said the classes will prepare him for the academic rigors that await.

"I'm just excited to get there and start," Okyere-Bour said. "And I know that if it took that much work just to get in, what's coming isn't going to be easy."

Okyere said he's ready.

"I realized I love the Army when I was at basic training," Okyere-Bour said. "I want to do everything I can for the Army and I think the best thing I can do is become a leader. I believe I can make it."

He'll have a lot of Soldiers in New Jersey pulling for him.

When Mahon, the platoon sergeant, announced at a recent drill that Okyere-Bour had made it into West Point, the formation applauded for more than a minute.

"Private Okyere worked very hard to achieve something most people just can't do," Mahon told them. "We should be proud of him – and remind ourselves that only through hard work do we achieve what we want."

GUARD CHAPLAIN PROVIDES 'MINISTRY OF PRESENCE'

Life support is what Capt. Vincent E. Stokes, Chaplain for the 119th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, is in the business of.

An often behind-the-scenes-role, chaplain services bolsters morale and community within the ranks.

"My goal is to make an impact on Soldiers' lives," said Stokes.

Responsible for providing ministry in a pluralistic environment and performing a variety of family centered and spiritual support services, Stokes is an advisor to battalion of Soldiers comprised of truck drivers, medics, military police and many more.

His work strengthens each mission by acting as a multiplier, says Stokes, who offers a message of hope and resiliency through a three-prong approach to ministry. One: Nurture the living, Two: Care for the wounded and three: Honor the dead.

Through what he calls a ministry of presence, most often his greatest service to Soldiers is providing a listening ear.

"We don't provide answers; we are mentors," Stokes said. "Most Soldiers just want someone to listen and a safe place without judgment. Without saying a word I can be there for them."

A true serviceman, Stokes started his military career in the Marine Corps in 1980 as an infantrymen, went on to enlist in the Air Force and has been serving in the Army National Guard since 2010. A varied career of service that makes him one relatable guy. The emotional needs of the modern solider are complex and Stokes has the experience to share in their needs and concerns.

With the goal to meet the religious needs of all his Soldiers, recently his job has been focused on preparing Soldiers with the 328th Military Police Company for their deployment to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Stokes has hosted services during the unit's annual and pre-mobilization training as well as counseling sessions. In his role he also conducts military weddings, hospital visits and connecting Soldiers with specific religious needs.

It seems there isn't a part of a Soldier's experience that Stokes doesn't play a part in; but, for the Soldiers who don't fully understand what chaplain services and resources are he wants them to know that his is always there.

"The most rewarding part of my job is being available for Soldiers," said Stokes.
